(SATs) toward the end of the year. As part of our drive to challenge our children, as well as help them to reach their full potential, your child has been identified as *possibly* having what it takes to reach the well above average Reading standard for Year 6.

Whilst we will of course be doing all that we can at school to challenge your child in Reading, we are of course aware that parents & carers may wish to help & support their child at home.

This booklet aims to share just a few ways in which you can support your child as they aim for those higher level reading skills!

Activities to Help Potential Higher Level Readers:

- Read a wide variety of texts & genres: fiction, non-fiction, quality newspaper reports, blogs & articles.
- Keep a Word Journal & make lists of new vocabulary & glossaries of new terms; find definitions & write own sentences using the words.
- Discuss **Authorial Technique** pick out words & phrases that appeal to you as the reader (interesting, emotive, creative, descriptive, metaphorical, etc.). Explain why you think the author chose them & how they affect you as the reader.
- Discuss the **emotional impact** of what has been read & how you might make it more or less intense for the reader.
- Discuss the **motives or characters** in fiction & why they behaved as they did, plus what the clues are from the text to deducing this.
- Use **inference** by 'reading between the lines' of what is hinted at.
- Try to synthesise the relevant points from a text to give a summary or opinion.
- Think about how a text has been **structured** & why the author has done this.
- Discuss the **author's viewpoint** from a text, how you know & what your own viewpoint is.
- When answering a question, always refer back to the text & consider the PEE (explain your point, back up your answer with evidence & then explain your thinking).


